Besides abandoning his wife, he also escaped to drinking and felt disappointed. Thus, when Michael Henchard undergoes frustration in the following years, his former behaviours as mentioned above reappear. Again such behaviours experienced by Michael Henchard are caused by his poverty, his failure in gaining a goal.

Further, Michael Henchard's failure in gaining his goal is caused by such factors as lack of specific ability, inadequate self - control and omission of reward. In fact, he is successful but these factors appear so that he comes to the failure both in love and in business. His lack of specific ability makes him defeated by whom who is smarter than he. His inadequate self - control puts him into the failure, too. Because by inadequate self-control one must have done something wrong which next puts him into the trouble. Last of all, his omission of reward leads him into

the condition of frustration. This is because he is nothing and cannot help standing in front of the people after having no possessions.
