

CHAPTER IV

C O N C L U S I O N

Stereotyped impressions usually occur within a group/ethnic group or among several groups/ethnic groups. One of the stereotyped impression is the stereotypes toward a language and its speaker, as it is described in this paper namely the stereotypes of Javanese SMP students toward the Madurese accent speaker-guise and Javanese speaker-guise.

From the presentation and analysis of the data, it can be concluded that there is, indeed the stereotyped impression of Javanese SMPN VII students toward the Madurese accent. This is proved by firstly, the sum of students who accept the speaker-guise as their computer instructor are less than that of the students who do not accept. It is different with the students addressed by Javanese accent. The total number of those who accept the speaker guise are more than the total number of students who do not accept. Secondly, when the students are addressed by Madurese accent, they give two judgments which belong to unfavorable traits, namely they rate the speaker-guise as 'Kaku' and 'Keras', on the contrary, the



speaker-guise is rated as 'Tak kaku' and 'Lembut' by the students addressed by Javanese accent.
