The **Conclusions** are presented in an interesting way. I consider it valuable and worth emphasizing that the Authors mentioned the limitations they encountered during the research.

Summing up, in my opinion the topic of the article is interesting and has the potential to interest potential readers. However, taking into account the selection of the sample (I mentioned it above), I am not entirely sure whether this paper in its current form qualifies as



an "article" or it should be submitted rather as a "communication"? I leave it for the consideration of both the Authors and the Academic Editor.

In my opinion, the Introduction chapter well introduces potential readers to the topics discussed by the Authors. The aim of study is clearly specified (lines 83-89). However, I would suggest a clearer indication of what the novelty of this article is and what exactly it brings to the literature.

### Response 1.

As you suggested, we added the novelty statement in the introduction section. We add:

"Recent bibliographic study on tourism and disability suggest that future work on tourism and disability should focus more on developing countries to highlight issues and needs of disabled people and their experience in tourism (Singh et al, 2021). This research fills the lack of studies on the travel experience of people with disabilities, specifically in Indonesia. Hence, the novelty of this research involves the use of Indonesia, a developing country, as the context of disabilities in tourism research."

We input all the references on social tourism that the reviewer recommended. However, we cannot delve deeper into the subject since we do not focus on implementing social tourism.

#### Point 3.

### Response 3.

For the method section, we argue for the representativeness of our sample. We exclude several types of disabilities and use unbalanced gender distribution to reflect the reality in higher education for people with disabilities in Indonesia. We wrote:

"Our samples only consist of a somatosensory type of disability. Specifically, almost half of the participants (45%) are in the cerebral palsy category, a quarter of the visual impairment category, and 30% are quadriplegic. We did not find any participants in the intellectual and mental disabilities categories. This result is expected since higher education is cognitively loaded and needs emotionally controlled individuals. Although the Indonesian government welcomes people with intellectual and mental disabilities to attend higher education, they cannot pass the selection test because of their limitations (Yusuf, 2021). Historically, people with mental and intellectual disabilities have been excluded from attending higher education (Wehman et al., 2018). Developed countries have some programs for students with intellectual and developmental disabilities to access higher education (Grigal et al., 2019), while Indonesia still does not have a similar program.

Of course, we could search for intellectually and mentally disabled persons beyond the college environment. However, interviewing subjects with these disabilities proves challenging (Hollomotz, 2018), and needing an experienced interviewer for the subjects (Sigstad & Garrels, 2018), which we currently do not have. Proxy interviews with the caregiver are possible but highly controversial since there is no guarantee that the caregiver is motivated to give the answer that fits with the subject's knowledge (Wolkorte et al., 2019).

Despite the limitation, the research sample represents Indonesia's two most prevalent forms of disabilities. As much as 30% of people with disabilities in Indonesia have visual impairments, and 26% have physical impairments, including cerebral palsy and quadriplegic. Other impairments are in lesser proportions, such as hearing (22%), mental (12%), and chronic (including intellectual) (10%) (ILO, 2012).

Regarding gender, our informants' distribution is different from the population. We have 30% female and 70% male, while the national survey put 58% female and 42% male identified with disabilities (Ministry of Health, 2014). The national prevalence figure fits with the global figure for people with disabilities. Our informants consist of more males than females because females with disabilities are more likely to live in conditions characterized by poverty and isolation, including educational isolation (Valentine et al., 2019). Despite this tendency, we still have voices from females in our informants. Hence the representative voices for females still exist. We do not need to gain more gender-balanced informants for this reason.

The data collection was performed on May 2021.

For the limitation, we wrote them. The limitation is placed in the last paragraph of the paper.

Comments and Suggestions for Authors This manuscript highlights some important gaps in the tourism literature in terms of accessible tourism and, in particular, accessible tourism from a non-Western perspective. However, the manuscript could benefit from a tighter focus on the tourism experiences of people with disabilities and additional development of this topic.

## Response for Reviewer 2

Thank you for noticing the strengths and weaknesses in our work. We put much thought into the paper.

### Point 1.

Parts of the introduction and literature review overlap, leading to a feeling of redundancy. For example, the authors define disabilities and accessible tourism in both places. In addition, the literature review delves into topics pertaining to the relationship between people with disabilities and tourism that are beyond the scope of the research conducted in this study, such as employment of disabled persons in tourism. While this is an interesting and important topic for tourism research, it is not directly addressed in this research. I would like to see more discussion of the literature on tourism experiences among this demographic to provide an appropriate context for the study. The authors state "strengthening theory" as an objective, yet there is little development of an existing theoretical framework in the literature review.

## Response Point 1.

For the literature review, we erased the two overlapping sentences (i.e., definitions and accessible tourism) because they were already written in the introduction. We also erased the employment issue since it is not the focus of this research. We add this paragraph to discuss tourism experiences among demographics:

"Seeing and walking difficulties (visual and physical impairments) tend to be the most common functional difficulties in the world compared to hearing, cognition, self-care, or communication (Mitra and Yap, 2021). Seeing and walking difficulties could acquired in lifetime, for example by old age, accidents, or diseases (Kuper, 2019). Specifically, walking difficulties could present from cerebral palsy or quadriplegic. Cerebral palsy is on of the walking difficulties that originated from birth because non-progressive disturbances that occured in the developing fetal or infant brain (Pavone etal, 2021). Quadriplegia is the condition when someone unable to use their arms and legs. Cerebral palsy could be one of the source of quadriplegia beside lifetime acquired source. These demographics generally obstructed most by physical barriers (Rooney e tal, 2018). People with visual impairment also obstructed by communicational barriers and needs touch-based or audio-based communication tool for well functioning in public, including tourism spots. Some people with cerebral palsy also affected by communication barriers. Since visual and physical difficulties are the most prevalent in the world, and also in Indonesia, our focus in this research is visual and physical difficulties, specifically blind, cerebral palsy, and quadriplegia."

We also presented affective events theory as the theoretical framework and looked forward to strengthening the theory. We wrote:

"Recently affective events theory (Weiss and Cropanzano, 1996) have been applied for accessible tourism context by viewing inaccessibility as service failure (Lee etal, 2021). Affetive events theory states that affect can influence the way in which employees interpret their work context and consequently shape attitudes (Nimon et al, 2021). The theory is a significant departure from previous theoretical framework that focused on dispositional/personality approach (Weitz, 1952), cognitive judgment (Ilgen, 1971), and social influences (Salancik and Pfeffer, 1977). Despite the original focus of the theory is on employees, the theory have been succesfully used to explaining tourists behavior (Stylos et al, 2022). Hence, the theory also applied for tourists with disabilities (Lee etal, 2021). However, previous research only tested the theory without comparing it with rival theories. This research have the opportunity to test whether the attitude of tourists with disabilities formed by disposition, cognition, social influences, or affective judgment."

#### Point 2.

In the method section, the authors identify five key themes for interviews as well as five key emergent themes. Presumably the former is intended to reflect prompts for the semi-structured interviews, but it would be helpful to have additional clarification of these themes and how they were incorporated into the interviews. Additionally, it might be helpful if the authors used different terminology for the topics directing the semi-structured interviews and the themes that results from data analysis.

### Response Point 2.

Using "theme" for interview questions and results is quite confusing. So we replace the "theme" for the interview with "questions." We give a reason for each question. The questions and the theme itself are not in one-to-one correspondence since the first question (demographic), and the last question (suggestion) are part of the general structure of a scientific interview (i.e., opening and closing). So the themes in the results are mainly generated from the three questions between demographic and suggestion. We wrote:

"The personal demographics questions is structured and introduce the interviewer and interviewee into the conversation. Conversely, the suggestion/hope questions closed the interview process to gain new insight not previously talked in the conversation or bring deeper thought of interviewee to give effect for the betterment of situation. Three core questions (experiences, access to facility, and access to information) are the source of themes that will emerge in the data analysis. All of these core questions will explore the life experience of the person with disabilities in performing tourism."

#### Point 3.

The results section needs considerable development; it is not sufficient to list quotes with no discussion of the theme and the sentiments expressed by the study participants. Moreover, with presumably more than 20 hours worth of interviews, it is somewhat disappointing to see quotes reduced to statements such as "little seating". This does little to reveal the potential insights into tourism experiences for

this understudied demographic. Much of the discussion section could be restructured to more effectively contextualize the data revealed in this section.

The discussion section also introduces concepts that have not been previously discussed, such as Dann's seven elements and memorable tourism experiences. If the interview data will be interpreted through such conceptual frameworks, they should be discussed earlier.

### Response Point 3.

The structure of the result section now changed. Previously we described all quotes from the interviewee. In this revision, we only give one long quote that we feel is representative and detailed enough to represent the theme. Each theme is now structured in three paragraphs. The first paragraph describes the general result, while the second describes an example, including the quote. The third paragraph either describes more result, points out the differences between samples (i.e., unheard vs. heard voices, informants with visual impairments vs. physical impairments), or conclude the section with a brief explanation. We hope that with such a structure, the potential insights from their tourism experiences could be more revealed.

We revert the Dann typology to the literature review section. We also add a theoretical discussion and implications related to affective events theory. We said: "Enjoyment motivation indicates the needs for emotional releases and pointed to the affective events theory (Weiss and Cropanzano, 1996). Furthermore, the narration given by the informants fit with emotional-laden events. They sad with unaccommodated needs, they fear to walk alone, and they angry with the lack of empathy people gave to them. The "unheard voices" theme generally covers cognitive aspect of tourism since they think and reasoned for the lack of unaccomodated needs in tourism spot. However, only nine of 20 informants discuss about this situation. Indeed, unheard voices theme is the less mentioned theme by informants. Social influences apparently limited to in-group conversation. One of the informant even said that she get out from Indonesian Disabilities Organization social media group because they talk about unimportant stuffs and lack of order. We could not judge for individual disposition of the informants but generally, the emotionally dominant naratives we found give more support for affective events theory. Theoretically speaking, our research strengthening affective events theory as the best behavioral explanation for accessible tourism, in line with previous research (Lee et al, 2021)."

#### Point 4.

Finally, in the conclusion, it is unclear what the authors believe is the key "take away" from the study.

## Response Point 4.

In the Conclusion section, we present three takeaways from this study:

"This study offers three takeaways on how to achieve more accessible or inclusive tourism in developing countries. First, tourism for people with disabilities are an emotional-laden event that need to be considered by tourism managers. Officers should be aware and understanding the special needs of people with disabilities and communities need to educated more about how to empathize them and communicate with them with full awareness of their difficulties. Second, voices of people with disabilities shoud be heard and incorporated in tourism planning and decision making process on city and destination level. When such consultation performed, it should be disseminated fluently to all of the members of disability groups to change their attitude about people without disability. Finally, tourism destination should offer more sensorial experiences other than seeing and moving. Various touch-based and audio-based elements should be added to the destination. These multisensoric addition should be specific enough such that even non-disabled person could enjoy. Of course, this also means that the accessibility of the facilities should be improved. Improvement could be in form of additional seats for rest for people that only able to move in short distance and unobstructed lanes. Other improvements include rams for wheelchairs and of course wheelchairs itself, braille and audio signs, guiding blocks, and lower viewing scapes such that it can enjoyed while people in sitting position."

For the standard evaluation from the journal, we note that you evaluate that we must improve our description and contextualization content with previous theoretical and empirical research, giving coherent, balanced, and compelling arguments and discussion, and giving specific conclusions supported by the results. As you can see, we now add the theoretical context of our study, i.e., affective event theory. We also give more arguments and discussion on the relevance of the findings to the theory. We also add takeaways in the conclusion section. So we think this will improve the evaluation.

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

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


