CHAPTER I

I.1 BACKGROUND OF THE STUDY

There are several considerations why the writer is interested in the cultural problem in <u>"The Joy Luck Club"</u>. This story tells about conflicts between Chinese immigrant mothers and their Americanraised daughters, completed with the conflicting views and the stories of both sides. It shows us how difficult to raise children in other cultural environment, as the daughters try their best to be "Americanized" and at the same time casting off their heritage while their mothers watch on, dismayed. <u>"The Joy Luck Club"</u> also involves our feeling to imagine and to feel the fears of cultural identity; the difficulties in growing up as a Chinese-American and the problems in assimilating into modern society. Where the assimilation itself is "the process by which minorities gradually adopt patterns of the dominant culture" (Macionis, 1991:317).

And the most impressive reason that brings the writer to analyze this work is the characterization of the main character: Jing-Mei Woo. This character represents the vision of younger generation which is willing to explore and appreciate the vision of others, especially in' this case is the older generation. But then Jing-Mei Woo finds a difficult position ever since her mother's death. She discovers her mother's background before the immigration to United States that brings the fears of cultural identity. Here Jing-Mei's struggle to overcome her fears has impressed the writer much since it leads him to understand people better by appreciating the values of her struggle in the most difficult stage of her life.

In addition, this literature work is very interesting to be appreciated since the author could illustrate well the fears of cultural identity. Eventhough Amy Tan's life is very contrast with the characterization of Jing-Mei Woo, she can imagine the fears of cultural identity which may happen to others.
