CHAPTER I

INTRODUCTION

A. Background of the Study

The Stepford Wives is a movie about the domination of husbands to their wives. Some people believe that wives should be placed in private area, whereas the public area is dominated by husbands. The wives responsibility is doing the housework while the husbands' is working outside the house to earn money. However, many women have their own career outside the house. 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According to Ira Levin, in 1972 the Women's Liberation Movement was at its zenith. How dare men have demands of their own and replace American women with robots. Considering those reasons, Ira Levin writes *The Stepford Wives*.

Many filmmakers have make movies based on Levin's books. The Stepford Wives is one of them. The Stepford Wives became a movie in the year of 1975 and 2004. As the movie successful in taking attention of the audiences, they make several sequels of it for television. They are: Revenge of the Stepford Wives (1980), The Stepford Children (1987) and The Stepford Husbands (1996) ('Ira').

The writer chooses *The Stepford Wives* which is made in the year of 2004 in his analysis. It is a remake of the 1975 film adaptation. Director Frank Oz and Script writer Paul Rudnick present a dramatic reworking of the horror classic, putting a totally over the top slant on the story that gives it true comedic value.

Frank Oznowicz, the director of *The Stepford Wives* 2004, was born in Hereford, England on May 25th 1944. Movies to which Oz has lent his voice include *The Muppet Movie* (1979), *The Dark Crystal* (1982), *The Great Muppet Caper* (1981), *The Muppets Take Manhattan* (1984), *The Muppet Christmas Carol* (1992), and *Muppet Treasure Island* (1996). He also performs Yoda in *Star Wars: Episode One - The Phantom Menace* (1999) and the other *Star Wars movies*.

As an actor, Oz has appeared in *The Blues Brothers* (1980), An American Werewolf in London (1981). Trading Places (1983), Spies Like Us (1985),

Innocent Blood (1992) and The Blues Brothers 2000 (1998). In 1986, Oz directed his first movie, Little Shop of Horrors. Since then, he has directed Dirty Rotten Scoundrels (1988), What About Bob (1991), Housesitter (1992), Indian in the Cupboard (1995), In & Out (1997), Bowfinger (1999), The Score (2001) and The Stepford Wives (2004).

Paul Rudnick, the script writer of the movie, was born on December, 29th 1957 in Piscataway, New Jersey. Early on, he knew what he wanted to do with his life, writing in a grammar school essay that he wanted to be a playwright.

Rudnick knew he was gay by the time he went to Yale University, where he received a B. A. in theater. He considered further study at Yale's graduate program in drama, but soon decided he needed to move to New York to begin a career in writing.

Rudnick wrote two ruthlessly funny satires: Social Disease (1986), and I'll Take It (1989). In 1996, Rudnick premiered The Naked Eye. He has also written and doctored screenplays. He wrote the original version of the film Sister Act (1992), which he intended as a raucous Bette Midler vehicle. He also wrote or helped write the screenplays for The Addams Family (1991, uncredited contributor) and Addams Family Values (1993), and The First Wives Club (1996, uncredited contributor). He also wrote the screenplay for Isn't She Great (2000). He also contributed the screenplay to Richard Benjamin's disappointing Marci X (2003). More successful was the screenplay for Frank Oz's star-studded comic remake of Bryan Forbes's 1975 film of Ira Levin's 1972 novel Stepford Wives (2004).

In the early 21st century, a fast-paced Manhattan couple, Joanna (Nicole Kidman) and Walter (Matthew Broderick), both work for a major television network. While she is a leader and breadwinner in producing reality shows, he is a mere middle management type. So when Joanna has a nervous breakdown, and Walter takes command, he's happy to find that for once in his life she's not stealing his fire. This sentiment is only asserted by the boys club that welcomes him when they move to the perfect town of Stepford, Connecticut. There, the women have been transformed by their husbands into a totally submissive, nearrobotic state in which they are blissfully happy doing housework and looking pretty, and are totally compliant to their men. With Claire (Glenn Close) and Mike (Christopher Walken) leading this web of weirdness, Joanna and her only normal friend, Bobbie (Bette Midler), race to solve the mystery before they too become Stepford wives.

The writer is impressed by Claire's behavior, especially which is related to her curiosity in creating perfect housewives. He is interested in analyzing some factors that motivate Claire in doing her experiment. Her ambition really influences her psychological condition because it seems that she looses her consciousness.
